"Marriage In the Lord"

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SPIRITUALITY OF BECOMING MARRIED IN THE LORD

"Married in the Lord" is how the early followers of Jesus described their spirituality-based marriages. In fact, in the first centuries of Christianity, in the Roman Empire, Christians would experience two ceremonies. They first would marry civilly, but later would seek out a bishop or priest who would assist them in becoming "married in the Lord". To be married in the Lord, then and now, adds a huge qualitative difference to a married relationship. In a Catholic marriage, or in a marriage between a Catholic and a Christian from another denomination, the ideal is that both parties are fully initiated into the Body of Christ. In Catholic culture, this means that the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist have been celebrated. Christian marriage is a sacrament of vocation. Having been fully initiated into the Body of Christ, the Church, a person, a couple through marriage, celebrate how they are going to live out their discipleship, as a couple, in a small cell of the Church, the domestic Church of the home.

Becoming married in the Lord is an important notion. Marriage is a process that really begins in our families of origin and continues in patterns of friendships, through dating. Eventually there is the experience of attraction to a special someone, exclusive dating, engagement, the public celebration of vows of commitment, and then the months and years after the ceremony of growing more deeply in love and commitment. A couple simultaneously develops home and family, and grows to be an active witness of God's love for His people.

In the Judeo-Christian tradition, the notion of <u>covenant</u> is important. The Old Testament Jewish people believed God was in covenant with them. His love for them was an unbreakable bond. The Old Testament prophet Hosea, and also Isaiah and Jeremiah, began to see in marriage a reflection of God's covenant love. A couple are to have that same kind of unbreakable, faithful love for each other as God had for His people of the Old Testament. St. Paul and the early Christians taught in a similar way, that the marriage covenant is a reflection of the covenant love that Jesus Christ has for us, His Church. In marriage, a couple enters a covenant with each other and with God as Parent (Father), Lord (Jesus), and Companion (Spirit).

Becoming "Married in the Lord" is to experience what the Church calls a <u>Sacrament</u>. A sacrament is much more than a ritual in Church. A sacrament also is to be understood as a process, like the entire marital relationship. There are the months and years of childhood, adolescence, and young adulthood which are preparation time for the sacrament of marriage. There are the weeks and months of immediate preparation. There is the actual ceremony. Then begins marriage as a way of life. The Church never prepares people just for rituals. We prepare for the way of life that follows the ritual moments. The way of life that is this Sacrament of marriage is a life-long, unbreakable bond of faithful love that is both creative for the couple and procreative for society and the Church. A couple, becoming married in the Lord, is a sign to the world of the possibility of committed love and the reality of God's love.

Classically, the word sacramentum (Latin) has connoted two realities. The root meaning in ancient Rome was "vow", or "pledge". In each sacrament, a disciple is vowing to God, and the Body of Christ, the Church, to live in a certain way. The vow dimension of sacraments is quite clear in marriage. Sacramentum also connotes the sign function of the sacramental life. Sacramental people live as signs to the world.

Becoming married in the Lord is a process, a covenant, a sacrament, and a mission to the world and Church. Couples do not just marry for each other. Marriage in the Lord sends a couple out in mission to the world, and the Church, to enrich society and the Church with the depth and quality of their self-sacrificial commitment of love to each other. The world and Church ought to be enriched because a man and a woman become married in the Lord, and create home and family with each other.

As is clear, many profound, deep realities are going on in a couple who have decided to become married in the Lord. We in the Marriage Preparation Ministry praise God for your relationship. We will walk with you in preparation and also later when you have joined those who are living the sacrament of marriage.

CONGRATULATIONS! Becoming engaged is a big step! All of us who work with you during the marriage preparation process are eager to help you during the coming months. We know that planning a wedding can be a very hectic time for you. It is also a time that you will learn a great deal about one another and your families. You may be wondering where to begin. Before you check out possible dates/times for reception facilities, it is important to see if the church building is available.

WEDDING REGISTRATION: In order for a wedding date and time to be reserved, the bride, groom or their family ought to be registered at Holy Family and be a weekly participant at mass. People wishing to join the community must participate in the *Welcoming Process* before they are considered registered. Contact the Office of the Pastor at 847-907-3416 to see if the date and time you want is available. It is best to do this at least one year before your desired wedding date.

WEDDING TIMES: The time slots for weddings are:

Friday 5:00 p.m. (rehearsal is Wednesday prior at 6:00 p.m.)
Saturday 12:00 p.m. (rehearsal is Thursday prior at 5:45 p.m.)
Saturday 2:30 p.m. (rehearsal is Friday prior at 6:30 p.m.)
Sunday 2:30 p.m. (rehearsal is Friday prior at 7:30 p.m.)

On your wedding day, the church is reserved for you for two hours. You will have access to the church 30 minutes before your wedding to allow for flower placement, and 30 minutes after your wedding to allow for wedding party photos in the church.

The bride should arrive 45 minutes before the wedding and the groom should arrive at least 30 minutes before the wedding. Please eat prior to coming to the church and do not bring food or beverages to the church.

WEDDING FEES: Before a date can be held, the wedding fee must be paid in full. You will receive a form for payment of these fees prior to receiving a letter confirming your date. These fees are not refundable. There is also an additional fee if you are not a registered member of the parish.

PREVIOUS MARRIAGES: If one of you has been married before, you may be required to obtain a Church annulment. The Catholic Church recognizes the marriages of non-Catholics as valid. If your fiancée is not a Catholic, their previous marriage in another church or even a simple court ceremony may require a Catholic Church annulment or a declaration of nullity. To determine the validity of a previous marriage, call the pastor's office at 847-907-3416. If an annulment is needed, you will be asked to make an appointment with the pastor to begin the annulment process. The granting of annulments generally takes <u>at least</u> one year in this Archdiocese, but we have Annulment Ministry leaders who will help you through this experience.

BLESSING OF ENGAGED: There is a blessing for engaged couples three times a year (fall, winter, and summer) during Mass. You will receive an email invitation to these events when they are scheduled. On the days of the special blessing, our Marriage Prep Leaders will be there to answer any questions you have. We encourage you to invite family and friends to join us for the mass. All are welcome!

MEETINGS WITH PRESIDER: Holy Family will schedule a priest for your wedding once you have officially registered your wedding date. Occasionally we have couples who request an outside priest. You are welcome to invite a close personal friend or family member who is a Catholic priest or deacon to preside at your wedding, but we do need to know well in advance if you are doing this so we don't schedule one of our priests. Please contact Paula Nowicki in the Office of the Pastor to let her know. If you bring an outside priest or deacon in for your wedding, you are responsible for any fees or travel expenses for that priest.

You will need to make an appointment with your priest before your marriage. We recommend that you try to do this approximately 4-6 weeks before your wedding. At this time you will complete an official church document called a pre-nuptial questionnaire. Each of you will fill this out in the presence of a priest and swear that your answers are truthful. It is the official record of your wedding in this Church. This document attempts to discern if there are any reasons that you are not able to enter into a sacramental marriage in the eyes of the Catholic Church. In inter-faith marriage, the couple should have serious ongoing discussion regarding the faith of future children. When doing the pre-nuptial questionnaire, the Catholic party will be asked to sign a form or give verbal consent promising to do all in one's power to pass on his or her faith to their children, have them baptized in the Church and raised in Catholic practices.

Depending on your priest, you may need to meet a second time to go over your wedding liturgy. This can also be done at your first meeting if it is within a month or two of your wedding date.

REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

The following documents are required from those planning to marry in the Catholic Church. Numbers 1 -3 should be mailed to Paula Nowicki, Assistant to the Pastor, **three to four months prior to your wedding day**. Number 4 should be brought to your wedding rehearsal.

1. <u>Catholics:</u> Six months before your wedding date please request a newly issued baptismal certificate from the church in which you were baptized. To obtain a <u>newly issued</u> baptismal certificate, call or write the parishes at which each of you received this sacrament and ask them to mail you a newly issued certificate. A copy of your original baptismal certificate is NOT acceptable. The certificate must be issued within 6 months of your wedding date.

Non-Catholics: the original or a copy of the baptismal certificate from the church in which you were baptized - this does not have to be newly issued. We will make a copy of it for our records and return it to you.

- 2. **A Confirmation certificate**. This can be your original certificate. If you do not have verification of Confirmation, contact the church where you were confirmed for a new certificate.
- 3. **Proof of completion of a Catholic Marriage Preparation Program** (only if you have chosen a program outside of Holy Family's program).
- 4. Civil Marriage License from Cook County (please bring this to the wedding rehearsal).

CIVIL MARRIAGE LICENSE

You are getting married in COOK COUNTY and therefore you need a **Cook County marriage license**. A <u>Civil Marriage License</u> can be obtained at any of the six Cook County Clerk Offices (see "Applying for a Marriage License" page in the front cover of your folder for locations and more information).

The engaged couple must both be present when applying for a marriage license. The cost of the license is \$40.00 (cash) and is valid for sixty days. You should bring this document with you to your wedding rehearsal and give it to the rehearsal minister. The priest or deacon will sign the marriage license - no other signatures are required - and we will send it to the Vital Statistics Department.

You may obtain a copy of your *legal* marriage certificate in person at any of the County Clerk Offices or a Currency Exchange, on-line at www.cookcountyclerk.com, or by sending a letter of request. Allow two weeks after your wedding day before requesting copies. The cost is \$15.00 for the first copy and \$4.00 for each additional copy. If you are writing a letter, include the following:

- A completed marriage certificate request form (available on-line)
- Photocopy of your photo identification
- Check made payable to "Cook County Clerk"
- A self-addressed envelope
- Your phone number

MARRIAGE CERTIFICATE

You will receive a Marriage Certificate after your wedding which states that you have been married at Holy Family Catholic Community. This is *not* a legal document. After your wedding we will mail your marriage license into Cook County with the priest's signature on it. No other signatures are necessary. You must contact the Cook County Clerk's office to obtain the legal document for the purpose of legally changing your last name, or to have proof of marriage for other legal purposes. You can usually obtain this about two weeks after the wedding, once the paperwork has been processed.

MARRIAGE PREPARATION PROCESS: Shortly after your wedding date is confirmed, you will be contacted by a representative from our Marriage Preparation Ministry. You will be given information about your choices for marriage preparation. If you choose to go through Holy Family's program, you will be assigned a Sponsor Couple who will meet with you and 2-3 other couples on topics such including communication/conflict resolution, family of origin, balancing practical issues, intimacy/sexuality, values in marriage, and spirituality. The process generally takes about five sessions lasting for two hours each. It is also perfectly acceptable to choose another Catholic Marriage Prep program if our program doesn't work for your schedule. The Catholic Couple Checkup Premarital Inventory is also part of our program and is required for all couples getting married at Holy Family. See "Catholic Couple Checkup" for more information.

MARRIAGE PREPARATION OPTIONS:

Holy Family Marriage Prep "Marriage in the Lord" – Five sessions (two hours each) in a Sponsor Couple home with a small group of engaged couples. Sessions are flexibly scheduled according to the schedule of the group. The one on one review of a Pre-Marital Inventory with a Sponsor Couple is also included in this program.

CATHOLIC COUPLE CHECKUP: The directions for taking the Catholic Couple Checkup Premarital Inventory on-line are found below. All couples getting married at Holy Family are required to take this inventory, whether you are going through Holy Family's marriage preparation program or another program. A private meeting will be set with your Sponsor Couple to review the results of CCC if you are going through Holy Family's program. We also have trained Sponsor Couples who will be happy to go over the results of the CCC with anyone who is going through another program for marriage prep if you would like to discuss your results with a more experienced married couple.

The Catholic Couple Checkup (CCC) Pre-Marital Inventory is a tool used to help you understand your relationship and develop conversation around some of the issues that married couples face. The inventory is quite comprehensive, but it is NOT a test. You can't fail this! It is simply a program used to help couples focus on topics that will help them form the marriage they want to have for a lifetime together.

If you are going through Holy Family's Marriage Preparation Program, we ask that you take the CCC prior to your first meeting with your Sponsor Couple. If you are going through another marriage prep program outside of Holy Family, please forward the results to Holy Family as directed below and let us know if you would like to meet privately with a trained Sponsor Couple to go over the results.

Directions for taking the Catholic Couple Checkup Pre-marital Inventory

- 1. Go to www.familyministries.org.
- Click on "Catholic Couple Checkup."
- 3. Click on "engaged."
- 4. Check box to accept the terms and conditions of the inventory.
- 5. You will not need a "voucher code," so when you see the request for that, just go down to the bottom of the page and click "continue" and follow the directions for registering. You will be given an account number that each of you will use to access the inventory to take it. You should not take it together. Be open and honest with your responses to the inventory. Each of you should take it on your own using the account number given to you, and the results will be sent to your email address.
- 6. Payment There is a processing fee of \$29.95 for the CCC Inventory. You will need to pay that on-line with a credit card. This fee is not part of your Holy Family wedding fees.
- 7. After you take the inventory and receive your results, you will need to forward the results to Mary Whiteside at the church office. Please forward the electronic results (or bring in a printed copy) to mwhiteside@holyfamilyparish.org. This should be done prior to your first meeting with your Sponsor Couple if you are going through Holy Family's marriage prep program.

If you do not have internet access, please contact us and we will be happy to assist you with this process at the church.

THE SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION: We encourage engaged couples to take advantage of opportunities to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation prior to the wedding day. You will receive an email update when the All Parish Reconciliation services are scheduled, or your Sponsor Couple can give you the dates.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is not available on the night of the wedding rehearsal. If you or someone in your family/wedding party would like to take advantage of the opportunity for reconciliation, you can attend a parish wide reconciliation service, make an appointment with one of the priests, or attend between 3:30 and 4:15 p.m. on Saturday afternoons.

PLANNING YOUR WEDDING DAY

CHOOSING CULTURAL TRADITIONS: Many cultural traditions have developed over the years. It is important that you choose what makes sense to you. Begin by understanding what the tradition means and how it developed. Many traditions have been encouraged by the businesses that profit from their use (photography, florists, wedding coordinators, and caterers).

OTHER TRADITIONS: Balloon launches are environmentally incorrect. Throwing confetti, flower petals, rice, birdseed or silly string in or immediately outside of the church is not permitted. No bubbles are allowed inside of the Church building or in the Courtyard. If you wish to distribute bubbles to your guests, you will need to do so outside once your guests have left the building. Some of these traditions are more appropriate as you leave the reception. Please inform your guests that there will not be a receiving line at the church.

If you are having a Unity Candle at your wedding, you must bring your candles (large center pillar candle and two small taper candles) with holders to the wedding rehearsal. The set will be returned to you right after the wedding along with any leftover wedding programs.

RUNNERS: A runner is not necessary. The tradition of having a runner came from the desire to keep the bride's dress clean as she walked from her parent's home across a dirt road to her future spouse's home. Since this is no longer the case, the runner is an unnecessary expense that you can eliminate. If you do choose to have a runner, you or someone you designate will need to be responsible for the placement and removal of the runner. The aisle in the Church is 100 feet and the Chapel aisle is 36 feet. The runner will need to be tacked down with straight pins at the base of the altar. Be careful to choose a material for your runner that will allow you to walk on it without slipping. Plastic runners are prohibited as they are extremely slippery on our tile floor.

BOWS: Bows are allowed on the pews in the front section of the church to distinguish "family seating". They must be secured with rubber bands, elastic or ribbon. No tape or wire can be used on the pews because they damage the wood. Due to the fire code Holy Family does not allow the center aisle to be roped off or draping of the pews.

CHURCH DECORATIONS: The Worship Office works very hard to make sure that the decorations in the church are appropriate for the liturgical season. If you are getting married during the Easter or Christmas season, purchasing flowers of your own for the altar may not be necessary. During ordinary time, you may wish to add flower arrangements to the altar area. **The church environment (backdrops, statues, current floral arrangements or seasonal decorations, etc...) may not be removed for weddings.** Any decorations other than flowers or pew bows that you may want to add to the worship space must be approved by the Worship Office. Please keep in mind that there is only a 30 minute window to gather decorations after the wedding and you will most likely be working with your photographer at that time. Some couples have chosen to purchase their own tablecloth for the altar that they keep after the wedding. This is perfectly acceptable, but totally optional. If you do decide to do that, the tablecloth should be 60 x 120.

WEDDING PROGRAMS: The wedding program serves as a worship aid for those attending your wedding. If you have many people attending who are not Catholic and may not be familiar with our responses during mass, you may want to include the responses in your program so that everyone can fully participate. Holy Family does not provide programs for you, but we do have samples from other weddings and you are welcome to borrow them for ideas. WEDDING REHEARSALS: Members of our Rehearsal Ministry community conduct wedding rehearsals. These individuals are volunteers who have chosen this ministry to help make your wedding day a memorable one. Your rehearsal time is assigned when you book your wedding date. Your rehearsal minister will call you a week or two before the rehearsal to talk about the options that you have for procession, seating, and to answer any questions that you still have. Because the church is used for many events, it is important that your wedding party arrive **promptly** for rehearsal. Your wedding party includes all that have a part in your wedding (including those doing the readings). Your rehearsal will last approximately 45 minutes to 1 hour.

Please bring the following items with you to your Wedding Rehearsal:

- Marriage License from Cook County
- Unity Candle (with tapers and stand)
- Wedding programs/basket
- Bubbles/basket
- Copies of your first and second readings and Prayers of the Faithful
- Letters to each other (if Fr. Terry is presiding)
- Permanent Address form (found in the front pocket of your wedding manual)

AUDIO SUPPORT

Weddings have special technical support needs, requiring you to have a trained technician in the audio/visual loft during your wedding. This is included in your wedding fees.

VIDEO-GUIDELINES AND POLICIES

- Anyone videotaping the ceremony, whether they be a videographer you hire or a
 relative or friend, is not permitted to enter the audio/visual loft or place a camera in
 the loft without a Holy Family Audio Visual Technician on hand.
- All outside videographers should coordinate with the A/V technician, should he or she wish to place a camera in the loft.
- All videographers are responsible for bringing their own cameras, and equipment such as batteries, connections, adapters, and recording media.

PHOTOS AT YOUR WEDDING

This day of celebration is so very important in your lives, and you will undoubtedly want pictures of your church ceremony. Holy Family has set up some guidelines that help maintain the sacredness of your ceremony.

- Anyone taking pictures during the ceremony, whether they are a photographer hired by you or a relative or friend, must exercise discretion and respect at all times.
 Photographers may not enter the audio-visual loft or place a camera there unless there is a Holy Family Audio Visual Technician on hand.
- There is no flash photography allowed during the ceremony/Mass, but flash may be used once the wedding is over and family/wedding party pictures are being taken.
- During the ceremony, no photographer is allowed in the sanctuary area (on or above the steps across the front of the church). Instruct photographers to stay to the side of the altar area, on the tile "break" where the Baptismal font is located.
- Please also instruct your photographer to refrain from: stopping the bridal party walking in or out of the church, using spotlights, or running to capture a shot.

Many times, another wedding or event at Holy Family will immediately follow your wedding. For this reason, we ask that you quickly organize your group for post-ceremony pictures, and suggest that your receiving line take place at your reception rather than at the church. This will allow you the time you need for pictures without inconveniencing the next event scheduled at Holy Family.

It is important that your photographer checks in with the wedding minister at your wedding so that any necessary information regarding rules for photography can be shared. They are intended to help make your wedding a spiritual, joyful and memorable occasion, while still meeting your need to get great pictures of your day!

BRIDE'S ROOM: We have a room for the bride and bridesmaids to gather in before the wedding. Our room has a full length mirror and couches, and is also a washroom. Because we may have as many as four weddings per weekend, it is important that each wedding party remove all of their personal belongings as the bride and the bridesmaids leave the bride's room to begin the wedding procession. Be aware that another wedding party may be using the bride's room during your wedding ceremony. Please assign someone reliable to this task. Personal items can be returned to a car or placed in one of the last pews of the church

ALCOHOL: No alcohol (including champagne) is allowed on Church property which includes the parking lot, the church, the Narthex, the bride's room or restrooms at the rehearsal or on the wedding day itself. It is your responsibility to inform your wedding party of this parish policy. Also, make sure that no member of your wedding party drinks alcohol before arriving at the church. It is important that everyone remembers this is a sacred ceremony and appropriate behavior is expected.

SMOKING: Holy Family Parish is a non-smoking facility. This includes all rooms on the premises.

WEDDING PLANNERS: If you have hired a Wedding Planner to assist with your wedding, please make sure they have seen this manual or they have contacted the parish to learn about our wedding process. If you would like a copy of this manual for them, please contact Mary Whiteside in the Adult Faith office at mwhiteside@holyfamilyparish.org or 847-907-3450. We are happy to provide you with additional copies as needed. It is important that wedding planners understand the process at Holy Family so that we can work together to make your wedding day run smoothly.

MUSIC SELECTION AND FEES: Music selections which are pre-approved are included in this manual. If you would like a song that is not pre-approved you will need to contact Jeff Poindexter in the Music Office to have your choice approved. Fees and information about securing a soloist or musician are explained in a separate packet which is given at the Wedding Music Faire, an event that is hosted by the Worship/Music Office and is held three times per year. The Wedding Music Faire will help with the planning of your wedding music and also may help you with the selection of musicians and soloists for your wedding. Please contact the Worship Office at 847-907-3440 for more information about this event. You will be notified through email when a date is set for the next Wedding Music Faire. **The cost of soloists/musicians is not included in our wedding fees. For your wedding you will need to hire at least one soloist and one pianist.**

RITE FOR CELEBRATING MARRIAGE

As you prepare for your wedding celebration we encourage you to take a few moments to reflect on and remember that you are preparing for a very special and holy event. An event, as Canon Law reminds us, that has been "raised by Christ the Lord to the dignity of a sacrament."

We also encourage you to remember that the wedding celebration is to be a reflection of your life and love for each other; blest by Christ, and to be witness to the church of God's love and fidelity to all of creation. This said the following work pages have been designed to help you better understand your wedding celebration, and help you make choices that will reflect your story as a Catholic Christian couple.

MASS OR CEREMONY: It is a long-standing tradition that the exchanges of consent occur in the context of a mass. Although it is very appropriate to have a wedding mass, it is by no means obligatory. There are certain circumstances where a wedding ceremony would be preferable, especially when interreligious weddings take place. A ceremony can highlight the harmony of the couples' relationship rather than point out the differences in their religious beliefs or practices. Questions about whether to have a mass or a ceremony can be directed to the presiding minister. Please inform the church as soon as you decide if you are having a mass or a ceremony. You may want to use the Wedding Liturgy Planning Guide on page 17 to help you understand the Catholic wedding and to plan your liturgy.

WEDDING LITURGY PLANNING GUIDE

A copy of this form is in the front pocket of this manual. It is helpful if you fill it out before your Wedding Rehearsal Minister contacts you (a week or two before your wedding). You do not need to turn this form in to the parish. It is just a tool to help you plan your wedding liturgy.
