LEAD PASTOR REPORT

Every year as we get ready for our Annual Meeting, I prepare a report like the one you are reading right now. In writing my annual submission, I have a tradition of reading my updates from years past. In doing so, I'm reminded of all that has happened in the life of Quest. In my own life, as in our larger culture, there is a temptation to quickly move on to the next thing, the next project, the next chapter, the next job, the next...the list goes on.

As I look over the past 16 years at Quest, I am literally in awe of God's grace and faithfulness. I am often moved to tears by His favor upon our church.

OUR GOD IS A GOD OF POSSIBILITIES

It's now been over two years since we moved to our new church home in Ballard. As most of you know, it was a long journey. For several years, our leaders looked and looked, but there was nothing available. We even considered a move to north Seattle. But ultimately, we decided we needed to wait for God to move. Little did we know God had something entirely different in store for Quest. And on September 13, 2015, we hosted our first Sunday in our new church home in Ballard.

Why do I bring this up in our 2018 annual report?

This past year, we accomplished what some thought would take many more years to do. On June 11, 2017, we celebrated the completion of Our Next Quest—our capital campaign to fully pay off the purchase and renovation of our building. In total, we raised **\$2,376,228.62**.

Thank you to everyone who prayed, volunteered, and faithfully and joyfully gave to the campaign. And of course, we give God all the glory for His faithfulness and provision.

IT'S ALWAYS BEEN ABOUT THE WHOLE GOSPEL

It's important to remember that all along, this has always been about more than a building. The building, like everything we have, is merely a conduit by which we seek to faithfully embody our vision and mission to be about the whole Gospel through our values of Soul, Community, Reconciliation, Justice & Compassion, and Global Presence.

It's been encouraging to steward this building for our growing ministries. Nearly every Sunday we see different events taking place. This is one of the reasons why we needed a new building. However, Quest has always sought to be a good neighbor. As such, we are continuing to pray about strategic ways we can use our space beyond Sundays—to use our space to bless our city for “the common good.”

FROM BRAVE TO DEEPER

This past year, our theme was BRAVE. In our study through the Book of Joshua, we were regularly reminded of the powerful exhortation from Joshua 1:9:

*Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous.
Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the Lord
your God will be with you wherever you go.*

We witnessed the Holy Spirit do a work in the lives of many people within our church. We celebrated testimonies of decisions, baptisms, recommitments, forgiveness, breakthroughs, and faithfulness through pain and disappointment.

DEEPER

For 2018, our new theme is DEEPER.

As we enter our 17th year, my vision and hope for our church is that we might grow deeper in our identity, our faith, our walk, our obedience, and our ministries. Ultimately, I pray that we might grow deeper in our discipleship as followers of Jesus Christ.

One of the ways we envision this happening is through our study of Scripture. We'll be doing this in part through a new Bible reading plan called *Immerse* (spearheaded by Pastor Gail). And on Sundays, we'll spend the whole year in the Gospel of John. While we have studied many books and letters of the Bible since 2001, this will actually be the first time we'll be studying the entirety of one of the Gospels.

The Gospel of John was the first book of the Bible I ever read after I became a follower of Jesus at the age of 18. It was enriching then, but as I've been reading it again in preparation for 2018, it has been more revolutionary—eye-opening, mind-stimulating, and heart-changing—than I remembered. I'm particularly reminded of the words from John 10:10:

The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life and have it abundantly.

A JOURNEY THROUGH

THE GOSPEL OF JOHN

These are chaotic and confusing times. My prayer is that we might all be more deeply rooted in Christ in the midst of so many storms—deeper in God's Word, deeper in God's character, deeper in God's love, deeper in God's mission, and deeper in God's purpose for each of us.

If we're not careful, we can fall into the temptation of looking at faithfulness through the lens of numerical growth. Bluntly speaking, Quest is one of the bigger churches in Seattle. We occupy one of the largest church buildings in the city. Our ministries are growing—especially our Kids and Family Ministry. We're witnessing people make decisions to follow Christ, which is incredible. But let's not be foolish and assess our discipleship through numerical data. Don't get me wrong; we hope and pray that Quest will grow in numbers. But may we also grow deeper in our maturity and devotion as followers of Jesus.

I share this every year because it remains ever true: Thank you for giving me the great joy of being the lead pastor at Quest. Minhee and I feel so humbled to have planted Quest. We are privileged to be in relationship with you. We love you.

In light of these transitions, we welcomed seven new staff members in 2017: Chris Bonney, associate director of audio, video, and lighting; Jonathan Moua, associate director of Glocal Ministries; Carrie Yu, associate director of The BCC; Jenn Adams, case manager at The BCC; Phil Lewis, associate director of Amplify Youth; David Nguyen, facilitates manager; and Matt Lewis, creative & communications director. Also, while not new to our team, Matt Hornbeck became our full-time worship director. On behalf of the pastors and staff, we’re grateful for each of these gems and celebrate their additions to our team in this season.

HOMELESSNESS & HUNGER

The Bridge Care Center
Quest’s drop-in center for women and men experiencing homelessness or economic hardship in Ballard

Bread for the World
Faith-based advocacy to end hunger in the US and abroad

Sharing the Harvest
Local apples, global development, partnering the PNW with the Central African Republic through Covenant World Relief—in 2017, we ordered 201 bags of apples, raised \$2,1409, and planted 429 trees

IMMIGRATION & REFUGEE ADVOCACY

World Relief Seattle
We hosted World Relief Seattle’s Executive Director Chitra Hanstad and World Relief National’s Vice-President Jenny Yang during worship services to learn about the current refugee crisis, the need for people of faith to engage in advocacy, and how we can start to help.

Quest gave \$5,000 to World Relief Seattle to help with their ministry. World Relief Seattle welcomed 1,135 refugees from 28 countries this past year and had 450 volunteers who gave 25,000 hours to welcome them.

Cohorts
We host two Glocal Ministry cohorts—Immigration & Refugee Advocacy and Middle East Ministry. Middle East Ministry is a new cohort that we launched this year for people interested or already involved in ministry with the Muslim and Middle Eastern populations in Seattle and abroad.

RACIAL JUSTICE & RECONCILIATION

Faith & Race
We held our annual, multiweek, Faith & Race event in February. For the first time it was open to the public. Over 500 people from more than 20 churches attended.

Twenty-two volunteer leaders helped facilitate, pray for, lead, and gather our church over the three weeks of Faith & Race classes.

Faith & Race Action Team
The Faith & Race A-Team held two panel discussion this year—Faith & Race in the Workplace and Faith & Race and Sports. These panel events gathered people from both inside and outside our church.

MLK Breakfast
In January, Pastor Brenda was the keynote speaker at the MLK Breakfast; 20 Questers attended and celebrated city-wide reconciliation efforts.

GLOBAL PRESENCE

Thailand Trip
In January, 2017, six Questers went to Thailand for 12 days, performing public health education, visiting refugee camps and village areas, and supporting local leaders, Bob and Grace Shim.

C-Groups
For the first time, every C-Group participated in the Mission Partner Match-Up.

Covenant World Relief
We invested \$5,000 in solar panels, clean water, and indigenous leadership development in northwest Democratic Republic of Congo through the Covenant World Relief Congo Clinics partnership.

We sent \$5,000 to Covenant World Relief to assist in hurricane relief in Texas and Florida.

We sent \$5,000 to Covenant World Relief and the National Association of Latino Evangelicals for ongoing work to rebuild Puerto Rico.

THE BCC MINISTRY REPORT

Our volunteer base grew and so did the number of resources we distributed and neighbors we helped. The Bridge Advocates Team (BAT) helped collect over 600 letters to the state legislature advocating for housing funding. The BAT also planned and executed our annual Thanksgiving dinner, where we hosted 100 of our friends for an evening of good food, good music, and good company.

Overall, The Bridge Care Center continues our mission to empower people to take their next healthy step. We do this important work by being the bridge that connects people to both resources and hope. To do this, we provide case management, advocacy and referrals, internships, clothing closets, computer and phone access, and a community space where our friends can relax and pause.

COMMUNITY LIFE MINISTRY REPORT

A long time ago I once heard a pastor say these words about the importance of community:

There are many things a person can do alone, but being a follower of Jesus is not one of them.

The point is that we are both created and called to follow Jesus in community. One of our deepest expressions of that truth is through our Community Groups (C-Groups). My desire for our church is that as we continue to grow larger, we may grow smaller. And we do so by multiplying C-Groups throughout our city and beyond. One of the celebrations of 2017 is that we had over **40** C-Groups throughout the Greater Seattle area, stretching as far north as Lynnwood, as far east as Bellevue, and as far south as Rainier Valley. And just a couple here in Ballard. Well, seven. We are so deeply grateful for and honor our **90+** C-Group leaders who served faithfully as either hosts or facilitators. Over **400** of our Questers attended a C-Group this year, which is approximately **60%** of our church! We praise God for the work, growth, and love experienced through our C-Groups.

C-GROUP STORY

"In reflecting on that particular gathering, I felt we had a breakthrough; we took a step together as a C-Group in growing in our relationship with one another and being the Body. Sometimes, I've felt slightly frustrated that we haven't been able to grow like I've hoped for, knowing that being in community takes intentionality, and feeling like people just kind of showed up and would share a bit, but wouldn't go beyond that. And I'll admit, I haven't spent time actively asking God to work in that or thinking about how to help guide us to a deeper place. But completely by His grace, He made a way for the group to turn a corner last night...

It's now more out in the open that we need each other and that people want to be there for one another. And we've been together long enough that our growing closer is happening organically out of these needs and desires; it's not forced or contrived.

It was also cool to have a couple of people nod and say, 'We have therapists we can recommend. We see one.'

I can't describe it well; the opportunity to share more of ourselves presented itself. Not that anyone has necessarily been hiding anything, but rather the Spirit provided us with more of that space."

YOUTH & COLLEGE MINISTRIES REPORT

This year was an exciting time for Youth & College Ministries at Quest. We saw an increase in the level of participation and intentional engagement, but our biggest shift was with leadership. We were blessed by the addition of Phil Lewis as our associate director of Youth Ministry. Phil is doing a great job discipling our students, and he has been instrumental in the addition of our second midweek gathering.

This year, Amplify had its first Discipleship & Confirmation Class. This was a 10-month, discipleship course that met monthly. The topics included a biblical overview, church history, theology 101, and spiritual formation. Each student was partnered with an adult mentor from Quest. The class ended with the opportunity for students to write their faith statements and respond by being baptized or confirmed.

Our College Ministry now has a student leadership team, with representatives from various campuses, which helps set the vision and the calendar for College Ministry. This leadership team has helped orchestrate our first ever winter lock-in, our second annual fall retreat, and monthly worship nights.
