Since 2008, via a National Partnership Agreement, the Federal Government has funded states and territory governments to support the provision of high quality early education (preschool programs) for children in the year before school. This has resulted in increasing participation from 12 per cent in 2008 to 91 per cent in 2015.

5. In Australia only 58.5 per cent of three-year-olds attend a preschool program, (overall 62 per cent attend an early learning service, according to Report on Government Services, 2019). The
