
Website Storyboard

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
Multimedia Storyboard

What's In A Storyboard? Parts?

Central Idea

Beginning with your primary idea, you guarantee that your argument is communicated without crowding the slide with words. These core concepts should be no more than one or two sentences long and simple enough for your audience to read and grasp at a glance.

Supporting Content

This content might include facts and numbers, bullet points, or anything else that you believe helps to bring the core theme to life. Remember to keep the number of words on the screen to a minimum when incorporating supporting information.

Cues and Arrows

As you move through your text, you may come up with several graphic concepts to represent the words you are using. Making written notes will help you recall that brilliant idea you had while brainstorming.

Storyboard Sizes

A storyboard panel is a rectangular box drawn on paper. The specifications of this box vary but then it is typically 4" wide x 3" high. Alternatively, a typical 8 1/2" x 11" page has three panels. <u>Storyboard sizes</u> should be as near to the most popular aspect ratios as possible:
