Milad un-Nabi is a widely celebrated holiday in Muslim culture in commemoration of the great Prophet Muhammad's birthday. Like Maha Shivaratri, Eid-ul-Fitar, Eid ul-Adha, [Raksha Bandhan](#), and Dussehra, it is an annual celebration in Islamic countries.



Milad un-Nabi Definition & Meaning

Milad un-Nabi, aka Malwid, Id-e-Milad, or “the birth of the Prophet” in English, refers to the birthday of Prophet Muhammad, his contribution to Islam, and Muslim’s cultural history.

Milad un-Nabi is a holiday observed by Muslim countries, particularly India, to send gifts or donate to the poor in Rabi’ al-Awwal or the third month of the Islamic calendar.

When Is Milad un-Nabi?

The dates for Milad un-Nabi may vary because it all depends on the Islamic calendar. For 2022, Milad un-Nabi falls from October 7 (Friday evening) to October 8 (Saturday evening),

but usually, this holiday occurs on the 12th day of the month of Rabi al-Awwal from the Hijri calendar.

Milad un-Nabi Purpose, Importance

Why should Milad un-Nabi be celebrated, you might ask? It is a very important event, especially for Islamic countries. And here are some of the notable reasons why:

Prophet Muhammad's Birth and History

Prophet Muhammad's birthday celebration can be traced back to the 8th century when his birth home was eventually transformed into a prayer house by Al-Khayzuran. Lauded as a festival by the Shias, it was proclaimed a public holiday for most countries with Islamic traditions and culture. Hence, Milad un-Nabi is special to Muslims around the globe as he is the very center of why Islam is practiced in the first place.

Showcase of Islamic Culture

Besides celebrating Prophet Muhammad's birth, the holiday is also a time to display and practice Islamic culture. Examples include doing rituals, processions, gift exchanges, sandal rites, mosque lighting, and donations to those in need. So with this holiday alone, you can identify what Islam and its culture are like, and it is still being practiced for generations.

Zakat or Charity

To cleanse or zakat is heavily observed on Milad un-Nabi. On this day, donating to the poor is evident because helping poor people is said to please Allah. And zakat also follows the same direction of righteousness as Prophet Muhammad. So besides honoring Muhammad's birthday, celebrating with feasts, and showcasing Islamic traditions, helping the poor must not be forgotten on this holiday.

What's in a Milad un-Nabi?

Milad un-Nabi is practiced and celebrated in a variety of ways around the world. Some countries celebrate this as a big festival with lavish feasts and fun carnivals. In Pakistan, a gun salute and a national flag raise are practiced on specific monuments. And the most


ubiquitous examples are charity donations and exchanging gifts. But for centuries ago, rulers come up with a speech, are given generous gifts, and celebrate with animal sacrifices.


Facebook

1. Pick a [Milad un-Nabi Facebook post](#) template to edit.




Go to [Template.net](#) and explore a range of editable [Milad un-Nabi templates](#). There are a variety of options to choose from and you can start with a template in Facebook post format. Then, click “Edit This Template FREE.”

2. Input the words inside text boxes.




Press “Fill” from the left menu. Use every text box available to write your Milad un-Nabi greeting, announcement to the council and affairs, or even the time and date of the event you are organizing. Be sure the important messages are there so your Facebook post really pays off.

3. Add all sorts of graphics to design your template.






5. Preserve everything by hitting Save.



Move to the top-right corner of your worksheet. Then, click “...” for more options. And hit “Save” so you can finally make a Milad un-Nabi Facebook post with this template.


Instagram

1. Choose your preferred [Milad un-Nabi Instagram post](#) template.





2. Fill in the message.




Choose “Fill” from the left corner and begin altering the Editor tool’s text boxes. Click on a text box and type the message. You can use it to write your good wishes for the Prophet Muhammad, including your greeting for Eid Mubarak, add a speech for Madina, or insert the status of the Milad un-Nabi event you are planning.

3. Add the appropriate graphic elements.




Use “Graphics” from the Editor tool. You can choose pictures a drawing of a birthday card, an image of how you envision Prophet Muhammad or even celebratory stickers you want to flex on your template. Every image affects the output so make decisions meticulously.

4. Give room for the logo, background, or any other file to upload.



Whether you want to use your office logo, a kingdom as your background, or any other additional element, the Editor tool makes things possible for you. Explore the other tools such as “Logo” and “Background” to embellish your template even further. Ensure to mesh all elements accordingly so everything looks good together.


5. Save your entire work.


WhatsApp

1. Download a [Milad un-Nabi WhatsApp post](#) template.





2. Type the necessary words.





3. Incorporate the best graphics.





Milad un-Nabi vs Diwali


- Donate to your chosen charity or give gifts to the poor.
